*Note:* Cataloguing practices and access to items make it impossible to identify with confidence all titles with some sort of statement concerning stamp duty, so the following lists are to be considered as representative examples. Titles, imprints, and other details are standardized as to capitalization and word division. Where available, some bibliographical details are provided because they are potentially significant in relation to the application of stamp duty. Note that in relation to format: (a) where catalogues contradict one another preference is given to the holding library; (b) some possible turned chain lines are noted; (c) where catalogues do not specify a format it is inferred within square brackets.

\* *William and Margaret* is an anomaly here. Although the tax stamp dates it to June 1723–May 1724, around the time the ballad was written by the Anglo-Scots poet David Mallet, it is printed in black-letter, on both sides of a broadsheet, and includes typeset (not engraved) music notation. During the eighteenth century Mallet's *William and Margaret* was frequently printed on broadsides and in song chapbooks, and also on engraved broadsides with music notation, none of which provide any indication that stamp duty was paid. The black-letter broadsheet looks deliberately old-fashioned; it is quite different, for example, from the contemporary appearance of the topical ballad *The Fate of Courtezans and their Enamerato's* of 1735, which is in the same British Library volume and also bears a tax stamp. Foxon, 'Stamp Act of 1712', p. 72, argues that the broadsheet was not a popular ballad but a sophisticated imitation of one, which is why it was printed in black-letter at a time when ballad printers had changed to using roman type, and why it bears a tax stamp. That is a reasonable explanation for the use of black-letter, but in other respects the broadsheet does not bear a close typographical resemblance to many seventeenth-century broadside ballads. Still, it is not clear why such a quasi-antiquarian exercise would merit the presence of a tax stamp.
